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MDF ambulance's wintery operation

espite wintery conditions the Masawat Development Fund's ambulance is in full operation in the Charkent region, northern Afghanistan. Equipped with snow chains for part of the mountainous journey, the four wheel drive vehicle continues to save lives, transporting patients to hospital located in Mazar-e-Sharif.

Masawat Development Fund president, Najaf Mazari says, "Snowy conditions make it difficult for our driver, but thankfully the four wheel drive can continue to operate in the snow and ice."

In spring many roads are inaccessible to a standard vehicle due to melting ice. Equally in winter, the snow makes it difficult for cars to access the remote region. Residents are often cut off at these times, with some choosing to relocate to Mazar-e-Sharif. For residents without the resources to relocate, life can be extremely difficult, especially when they are sick, injured or due to give birth. Residents who remain in the region have the option of giving birth at home without medical assistance or travel up to 14 hours on the back of a donkey in the freezing snow.

The Masawat Development Fund now offers another option for residents, a free transportation service to seek medical attention in hospital.

The MDF ambulance continues to be one of the only free ambulance services to operate in the region. Najaf says the ambulance mainly transports pregnant women, but has been called to transport a variety of sick and injured patients from young children to the elderly.

The ambulance driver, Noor Agha assisted in a road traffic accident, where four people were seriously injured. He has also transported a patient under police guard.

Najaf said Noor Agha has had close calls with patients nearly giving birth in the ambulance. One pregnant patient was reported to haemorrhage, but thankfully reached the hospital in time to save her life and her baby's life. On another journey, the ambulance became stuck on ice dislodging the bumper bar. The driver managed to manoeuvre the damaged vehicle off the ice in time to reach hospital.

Najaf is energised by the emergency operation MDF is providing for his hometown. "I like to think for every mother we save we save a baby's life also".

"We are working with people we can trust, this is important to build MDF," he said. Najaf says that since donating the ambulance to the region 18 months ago, he has seen many different charities start up, but believes MDF is one of the only Australian non-profit charities who have remained in the area.

A small amount of Australian currency goes a long way in Afghanistan and with your contribution we can all make a difference to improving the living standards for people who live without basic health services and educational resources.

We have an exciting year ahead with plans for another film night scheduled mid year. Plans are in place for our annual Afghan dinner scheduled for early August.

Our shining star

Dan Cudmore shares the life of Noor Agha, the ambulance driver at the centre of the MDF emergency operation.

With a constant increase in patient numbers, the 24 hour emergency service has become a valuable medical resource for residents in the Charkent region.

This free medical service would not be possible without the dedication and professionalism of Afghan national, Noor Agha, who continues to save many lives.

Joining the Masawat Development Fund over 18 months ago, Noor Agha has proven himself to be highly skilled, operating the four wheel drive vehicle in all weather conditions. At times, the terrain is so steep the emergency vehicle is unable to reach patients. Mr Agha uses a custom made stretcher to carry patients to the vehicle.

As one of Masawat Development

Funds most valued team members working in Balkh province, Noor brings skill and expertise to the MDF organisation with four years driving experience for another NGO based in the region.

On call practically 24 hours per day, Mr Agha makes 10 to 12 return trips from the village clinic to the regional hospital in Mazar-e-Sharif each month. Each trip takes more than 6 hours return in summer and much longer in winter depending upon the degree of snow and ice on the roads. Recently he made three return trips to the hospital in the space of one day, driving for more than 18 hours to bring sick or pregnant women to the care of the regional hospital surgeons.

Mr Agha lives half of the year in Mazar-e-Sharif and the other half of the year he lives in the Charkent region, 50 km south of Mazar-e-Sharif. He has a wife and five children, three boys and two girls, who live and study in Mazar-e-Sharif. In Dari, the word "Noor" translates

into English as 'a shining ray of light'. We count ourselves as fortunate to have Noor Agha as a key part of our MDF ambulance programme.

Ambulance station update

The Masawat Development Fund is planning to build an ambulance station in Sharshar Village. Najaf has donated land to construct the dwelling planned to house the ambulance. Working in collaboration with an architect based in Melbourne, the dwelling will include two rooms. One room for an office and one for a bedroom for staff to stay overnight. The plan also includes a two car garage for the ambulance. Building will commence as soon as the snow melts and roads become more accessible for tradesmen to travel from Mazar-e-Sharif to Sharshar village.

Film Night Fundraiser

n Sunday 1st December 2013, the Masawat Development Fund held a charity film night to raise funds for the construction of an ambulance station in Sharshar village in northern Afghanistan.

The iconic Classic theatre at Elsternwick was a perfect location and with the MDF committee providing homemade Afghan style finger food prior to the event, the scene was set for a great evening of entertainment.

Nearly filling the cinema to full capacity, MDF members and friends raised around \$1,250 to fund the second phase of the MDF ambulance project. The second phase involves the design and construction of a permanent under cover office, reception area and garaging facility for the MDF ambulance. The documentary film 20 Feet from Stardom did not disappoint the audience, with over 120 members and guests settling into view the documentary based on the untold true story of the lives of backup singers who performed with some of the greatest musical legends of our time.

The film documentary directed by American filmmaker Morgan Neville, explored the unsung voices responsible

for shaping popular music of the era between the late 50s through to the 80s, something most of the audience could relate to.

The film also reflected on the conflicts, sacrifices and rewards of a career spent as a backup singer harmonising with others.

Boulanee is the Farsi word for "filled bread" and is an unleavened and stuffed turnover style flatbread from Afghanistan. The vegan flat-bread is either baked or fried with a vegetable filling, traditionally served as either an appetizer, side-dish, or main dish. Although boulanee is a traditional Afghan dish, there are variations of this staple savoury dish made with yeast dough, and filled with tasty fillings. Variations include, Turkish borek and gozleme, Greek calzone, and Indian samosa to name a few.
